About Us


Open in Mount Pleasant since 1993, Our Community Bikes (OCB) is a community bike shop where we use bikes as a tool for social change.

We equip the community with the resources and knowledge to access biking by providing refurbished education bicycles and mechanical skills to empower people and to enable their access to community services and opportunities.

We do this through a range of programs including Pedals for the People, Gear-Up, Youth Bike Club, DIY drop in, and a variety of initiatives which we deliver partnership with a range of local and national organizations.

Pedaling towards equity


Bikes provide access to independent mobility. There is a long way to go to ensure access for all.



Bicycles are critical for Transportation Justice

They enable community participation, the ability to earn an income and access services. Lack of options for affordable, reliable transportation can further limit opportunities for people to make the connections they need, and access the resources required to move beyond their current circumstances.

However, equal access to biking requires comprehensive grassroots efforts to make bikes and the means to maintain them widely available.



The long road to transportation equity

- Elevating voices: Urgency for community participation in biking, ensuring needs and demands of marginalized folks are heard.
- Affordability: Lack of options for affordable, reliable transportation can further limit opportunities for people to make the connections they need, and access vital resources and services
- Lack of representation: The cycling industry's workforce and target market lacks diversity. There numerous examples of are inequitable opportunities for underrepresented groups in sales and mechanics roles, as well as in purchasing cycling attire or riding itself.



Why Vancouver needs OCB

OCB uses the bicycle to empower individuals with skills and opportunities; along with improving access to mobility, through education and skill building opportunities in mechanics and wider life.



Free & affordable bikes

Refurbishing second hand bikes and donating them to those in need in our community.



Free & affordable servicing

Regular free maintenance clinics in various locations around Vancouver.



DIY & access programs

A range of programs to directly support people who have historically been marginalized from biking spheres, helping them maintain their own bike.



Youth mechanics education

Training programs for young people, allowing them to access employment in the cycling sector.



THE TRIPLE ACTION APPROACH



Social enterprise

Our social mission includes providing bikes to underserved communities, empowering people to fix their own bikes, and increasing diversity within the cycling industry.





Community bike shop

We sell refurbished bikes and bike parts. We are also a fullservice repair shop and bicycle recycling hub.





Bike programs

We provide education and workspace for people who want to repair their own bikes or learn how to do so.





OUR PROGRAMS

From youth clubs to bike recycling projects, OCB coordinates a huge range of programs aimed at building biking education, providing low cost transportation, community spaces, and environmental action.

Oppenheimer Park Repair Clinic

Every Tuesday and Sunday from 11:30am-2:30pm, we have a team set up at Oppenheimer Park to provide basic tunes and adjustments on bikes, walkers and wheelchairs. Supporting over 60 people every month, clinics ensure members of the downtown eastside community get the mechanic support they need to stay mobile.

We refurbish bikes, provide helmets, locks and lights, and subsidize annual repairs for people facing financial barriers. This program distributes over 100 bikes every year and subsidizes thousands of dollars in repairs annually.

Gear-Up

This free 13-week program, coordinated in cooperation with YWCA Metro Vancouver, equips youth ages 15–30 with the skills, certification and employer connections necessary to work as a bike mechanic.

Workshops

We are available to host small workshops or repair clinics for organizations, businesses, and events. We provide tools, stands, and a mechanic. These workshops cover a wide variety of topics from basic mechanics, to road safety and route mapping.

Donating bikes to those in need


OCB strives to combat transportation poverty by making biking for everybody, regardless of income.



As many communities struggle to find affordable, safe and reliable transportation, OCB's Pedals for the People program provides free bicycles for those most in need.

We provide affordable, sustainable transportation to members of our community who would otherwise be without it. We target people who are experiencing severe or ongoing financial crises or hardship in their lives that affects their overall wellbeing and their ability to obtain a bicycle. We actively reach out to the Vancouver community to match those in need with a bike which will suit their requirements.

Boosting the circular cycling economy

We are supporting the biking industry to improve its sustainability practices refurbishing and reusing materials, while educating consumer and partners in doing the same.

Biking's unsustainable secret

Confronting cycling sector's the environmental impact is a growing concern, particularly amidst the proliferation of e-bike sales.

It is estimated that almost 48,000 bikes are sold each day around the globe, with 15 million discarded each year. In the USA alone each year, 10 million inner tubes end up in landfill.

How we propel change

By encouraging reuse and repairs of materials and products (which are often simply discarded), OCB is curtailing landfill while simultaneously shifting waste. popular understanding of products' lifespan.

We were able to save 72 tonnes of CO2 in 2023 with potential further reduction of 1163 tonnes. This is the equivalent of 5.5 million kilometres of driving saved each year.

Refurbishing and donating



We receive donated bikes. refurbish them, and donate them to members of the community.



Education



We train others to undertand the importance of reuse, and contribute to research and studies improving on sustainability.

We sell refurbished parts, from pedals to fenders, to the local community, ensuring that even if a full bike is not operational, the parts receive a second life!




Dedicated refurb projects
